Virginia Unemployment Rate for April 2022

The Virginia unemployment was unchanged at 3.0 percent in April while total nonfarm payroll employment increased by 13,600

- Virginia's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was unchanged in April at **3.0 percent**, which is 1.3 percentage points below the rate from a year ago. According to household survey data in April, the labor force increased by 18,281 to 4,329,907, as the number of unemployed residents decreased by 1,324 to 129,771.
- The Commonwealth's **labor force participation rate** rose by 0.2 of a percentage point to 63.5 percent in April. The labor force participation rate measures the proportion of the civilian population age 16 and older that is employed or actively looking for work.
- From April 2021 to April 2022, the VEC estimates that establishments in Virginia gained 124,500 jobs, an increase of 3.2%. In April, the private sector recorded an over-the-year gain of 115,700 jobs, while employment in the public sector gained 8,800 jobs.
- Compared to a year ago, on a seasonally adjusted basis, nine of eleven major industry divisions experienced employment increases while two saw employment decreases. The largest over-the-year job gain occurred in leisure and hospitality, up 62,400 jobs (+18.4%). The second-largest over-the-year job gain occurred in professional and business services, up 18,600 jobs (+2.4%). The next largest over-the-year job gain occurred in education and health services, up 18,000 jobs (+3.4%).
- The largest job loss during April occurred in finance (-2,700 **jobs) to 207,500**. The second largest decrease occurred in manufacturing with a decrease of 1,000 jobs to 235,900.
- The largest absolute job increase occurred in Virginia Beach-Norfolk-Newport News (+2,600 jobs). The next largest absolute job gain occurred in Richmond (+1,600 jobs). The third largest increase occurred in Staunton-Waynesboro (+500 jobs). Northern Virginia added 400 jobs.

Making Sense of Labor Force Participation Rates: How Can They be Down and Also Up?

The labor force participation rate measures the proportion of the working-age population who are either working or actively seeking work. This measure gives insight into the makeup of a location's labor market; for instance, a low participation rate could signal a lack of job opportunities, or a population with many retirees. Additionally, areas with a high student population can also have lower participation rates, as they often forgo working to focus on their education.




Once Virginia went into lockdown in response to the COVID-19

pandemic, the state's labor force participation rate began to decline. By the end of 2020, the rate had fallen 3.1 percentage points – from 66.3 in January to 63.2 in December. Research suggests that such drops in labor force participation were mainly due to older workers retiring, parents exiting the workforce to care for their children, and discouraged workers in industries hit hard by the pandemic. At the workforce area level, most areas saw a decrease in their participation rates; with the Shenandoah Valley LWDA sporting the only increase, and the West Piedmont LWDA seeing no change. The areas with the largest declines were the Capitol Region Workforce Partnership (-2.6 percentage points), Hampton Road (-2.4 percentage points), and the Region 2000/Central Virginia Workforce area (-1.8 percentage points).

Due to changing demographics, the labor force participation rate may take much longer to return to pre-pandemic levels. Based on data from the US Census, the share of the population over the age of 65 is increasing. From 2010-2019, the share of people aged 65 and up increased from 13.1% to 16.5%. Virginia's population reflected these same trends, with the over 65 category increasing from 12.2% to 15.9%. Interestingly, labor force participation rates across all ages actually increased over this period. In other words, all age brackets have a higher participation rate than they did in 2010, but the sheer size of the baby boomer generation is bringing rates down, so comparing the statewide participation rate to pre-pandemic levels may not be as apt as it once was.


Virginia Job Openings and Labor Turnover – March 2022

The BLS Jobs Openings and Labor Turnover Survey released May 18th indicates that Virginians continued to switch jobs at a rapid pace in March, with both hiring and job separations speeding up in recent months.

- According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics' March 2022
 Job Openings and Labor Turnover Survey (JOLTS), Virginia set a record low for the number of unemployed workers per job opening.
- JOLTS data provides information on all pieces that go into the
 net change in the number of jobs. These components include
 job openings, hires, layoffs, voluntary quits, and other job
 separations (which includes retirements and worker deaths).
 Putting those components together reveals the overall change
 in payroll employment. JOLTS data is seasonally adjusted and
 describes conditions on the last business day of the month.
 Current month's data are preliminary and the prior month's
 data have been revised.
- The number of March 2022 job openings in Virginia was an 11,000 increase from February's 2022's revised figure of 199,000, but was 26,000 lower than last September's record high. The number of U.S. job openings was little changed at 11.5 million, the highest level in the history of the series which began in December 2000. Nationwide, job openings rose in several industries with the largest percentage increases in retail trade, information, and financial activities. The largest percentage decline occurred in government, led by state and local government education. Job openings increased in the South region. The Virginia job openings rate (job openings as a percentage of total employment) rose by 0.3 of a percentage point to 7.2% in March but was significantly lower than the series high of 7.9% set in September 2021. In March, the job openings rate nationwide increased in establishments with 50 to 249 employees and establishments with 250 to 999 employees. The job openings rate decreased in establishments with 10 to 49 employees.
- The number of hires in Virginia increased slightly by 3,000 to 182,000 in March and was 23,000, or 14%, higher compared to March 2021. JOLTS defines hires as all additions to the payroll during the month.

In February 2022, there were 310,000 job openings in Virginia, seasonally adjusted, which was significantly less than September's record-setting level of 336,000 job openings. The number of March 2022 Hires rose 1.6% to 187,000.

Initial and Continued Claims

Initial Claims:

- There were 10,203 initial claims in April.
- Initial claims decreased by 7% over the month.
- Year-to-date initial claims were 86% lower through April 2022 compared to the same period in 2021.

Continued Claims:

- There were 43,395 continued claims in April 2022.
- This was a 4% decrease over-the-month and an 82% decrease over-the-year.
- Year-to-date continued claims were 83% lower than during the same period in 2021.
